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Appendix E Public Participation

This appendix includes a summary of the public involvement and stakeholder outreach activities conducted by the United States (U.S.) Department of the Navy (Navy) during the scoping period and the public review and comment period for the Draft Fallon Range Training Complex Modernization Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The scoping period was held from August 26, 2016, to December 12, 2016. The Draft EIS was released for public review November 16, 2018, for a 60-day public comment period. The public comment period was extended by an additional 30 days, to close February 14, 2019.

The purpose of public involvement during the public scoping period was to (1) notify and inform stakeholders and the public about the Proposed Action; and (2) provide opportunities for the public to comment on the scope of the analysis, including environmental issues and potential viable alternatives. The purpose of public involvement during the public review and comment period of the Draft EIS was to (1) notify and inform stakeholders and the public about the Proposed Action and the release of the Draft EIS, and (2) provide the opportunity for the public and stakeholders to comment on the Draft EIS.

Outreach and involvement efforts were conducted in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act and Navy guidance.

E.1 Project Website

A project website was established to provide the public with project information and to accept comments electronically. The project website address is https://www.FRTCModernization.com; the website went live August 26, 2016.

The website address was included in the *Federal Register* Notice of Intent to Prepare an Environmental Impact Statement and To Announce Public Scoping Meetings and the *Federal Register* Notice of Public Meetings. It was also included in newspaper advertisements, stakeholder letters, tribal letters, media releases, public service announcements, fliers, and postcard mailers.

Public notifications, fact sheets, the executive summary of the Draft EIS, maps, frequently asked questions, technical reports, a project video, posters, and various other informational materials are available on the project website and will be available throughout the course of the project.

E.2 Scoping Period

E.2.1 Public Scoping Notifications

The Navy made significant efforts to notify the public to maximize public participation during the scoping process. A summary of these efforts follows.

E.2.1.1 Federal Register Notices

The public scoping period began with issuance of a joint Notice of Intent and Notice of Scoping Meetings published in the *Federal Register* August 26, 2016. The Bureau of Land Management published a Notice of Withdrawal Application in the *Federal Register* September 2, 2016. At the request of the public, the Navy extended the public scoping period to December 12, 2016, and a Notice of Extension of Public Scoping Period was published in the *Federal Register* November 10, 2016. *Federal Register* notices can be found in Appendix A (Federal Register Notices).

E.2.1.2 Newspaper Advertisements

Display advertisements were placed in local newspapers to advertise the public's opportunity to comment on the scope of the analysis. The advertisements included a description of the Proposed Action, the address of the project website, the duration of the comment period, and information on how to provide comments. The newspapers and publication dates are listed in Table E-1. An example of the advertisement is shown in Figure E-1.

NAVY TO PREPARE FALLON RANGE TRAINING COMPLEX MODERNIZATION ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT

FALLON, Nev. — The U.S. Navy is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act, to evaluate potential environmental effects associated with modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex. The Fallon Range Training Complex is the Navy's premier aviation training complex. It is located in the high desert of northern Nevada, 65 miles east of the city of Reno.

The Navy proposes to modernize the Fallon Range Training Complex, which would include land range expansion through additional land withdrawal and land acquisition, airspace modifications, and public land withdrawal renewal. The modernization is required because advances in warfare technology have outpaced the size and configuration of the ranges, hindering the Navy from fully sustaining realistic aviation and ground training.

The Navy's proposed action includes renewal of the existing 202,859-acre public land withdrawal that expires on Nov. 5, 2021; the withdraw and reserve for military use of approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land; acquisition of approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land; expansion of associated Special Use Airspace, as well as reconfiguration of existing airspace; and modification of range infrastructure to support modernization. The aviation and ground training to be conducted in the modernized Fallon Range Training Complex would be of the same general types and at the same tempos analyzed in Alternative 2 of the Final EIS for Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training Complex, Nevada (completed in December 2015).

The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the United States Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Navy Applies To BLM To Expand Fallon Range Training Complex

BLM Segregates 600,000 Acres While Navy Studies Extension, Expansion

RENO, Nevada – The U.S. Navy has applied to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to continue to use the site of the Fallon Range Training Complex and to expand it to include more than 600,000 acres of additional public land. As a result of the Navy's withdrawal application, the BLM has segregated the proposed expansion area from appropriation under the public land laws. The two-year segregation is obligatory while the Navy prepares an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) on its expansion and extension proposals for the Fallon site about 65 miles east of Reno.

The Navy published a Federal Register notice on August 26 stating that it would conduct the EIS on both renewing the existing public land withdrawal, which covers 202,859 acres, and the withdrawal and reservation for military use of another 604,789 acres of public land to expand the existing range. The Navy's authorization to use its existing acreage expires in 2021. Based on the environmental analysis, the Secretary of the Interior will make a recommendation to Congress on the proposed withdrawals. However, Congress, not the Secretary, will make the final decision on both the requested extension and proposed expansion.

As a first step in the EIS process, the Navy will hold seven public meetings on the proposed extension and expansion of the Fallon Range Training Complex. The BLM, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS. During the EIS, the Navy will consider existing uses of the lands. For instance, the Bureau of Reclamation and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service manage some of the lands. In addition, the Pony Express National Historic Trail, managed by the BLM and the National Park Service, runs through both the existing and proposed expansion areas. An expanded Fallon Range Training Complex would also overlap with portions of the Stillwater Range Wilderness Study Area (WSA), the Job Peak WSA, and the Clan Alpine Mountains WSA, which are all managed by the BLM. The U.S. Navy expansion would also overlap sage grouse habitat, the current Vegas to Reno Off-Highway Race course, numerous right-of-way corridors, and several grazing allotments. Current authorized uses of the lands can continue during the segregation.

The two-year segregation removes the expansion lands from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining laws, the mineral leasing laws, and the geothermal leasing

laws. Valid existing rights at the time of the segregation will be honored. The action is require under section 204(b)(1) of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976. Much of the existing Fallon Range footprint is already withdrawn from these laws.

The BLM manages more than 245 million acres of public land, the most of any Federal agency. This land, known as the National System of Public Lands, is primarily located in 12 Western states, including Alaska. The BLM also administers 700 million acres of sub-surface mineral estate throughout the nation. The BLM's mission is to sustain the health, diversity, and productivity of America's public lands for the use and enjoyment of present and future generations. In Fiscal Year 2015, the BLM generated \$4.1 billion in receipts from activities occurring on public lands.

This letter is to inform you that the Commander, United States (U.S.) Pacific Fleet (PACFLT) is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to assess the potential environmental impacts of proposed modernization of the Fallon Range Training Complex (FRTC), located in northern Nevada. This proposed modernization would include expanding land ranges, modifying airspace, and renewing public land withdrawals. The Department of the Navy (Navy) is seeking public input and involvement, which are important to the development of an EIS under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The FRTC is the Navy's premier aviation training range. It includes land training ranges and Special Use Airspace in northern Nevada, approximately 65 miles east of the city of Reno. The current FRTC bombing ranges have not changed substantially in size or configuration since the 1990s, or earlier in many cases. However, warfare technology has continued to change. In response to these changes, the Navy conducted a training capabilities study. This study concluded that the FRTC's training capabilities currently do not, and, in the future, will not meet the real-world needs of the U.S. military. Therefore, to address these shortcomings, the Navy proposes to modernize and expand the FRTC's land ranges, airspace, and infrastructure. The proposed modernization would also enhance the safety and security of local and regional populations and infrastructure.

The Navy proposes to:

- Renew 202,859 acres of existing public land withdrawal that expires in November 2021;
- Withdraw and reserve for military use approximately 604,789 acres of additional public land to expand existing land ranges;

- Acquire approximately 65,160 acres of non-federal land to expand existing land ranges;
- Expand associated Special Use Airspace and reconfigure existing airspace;
- Conduct the same general types and tempos of aviation and ground training as analyzed
 in Alternative 2 of the 2015 Military Readiness Activities at Fallon Range Training
 Complex, Nevada, Final Environmental Impact Statement; and
- Upgrade range infrastructure to support expansion and modernization.

Environmental Analysis

The EIS will include an analysis of potential impacts on environmental resource areas including: soils; air quality/climate; water resources and quality; airborne noise; biological resources; land use and recreation; socioeconomics, environmental justice, and protection of children; transportation; cultural resources; Native American traditional resources; and public health and safety. Your input in identifying other specific issues and resource areas that should be assessed in the EIS will greatly aid our analysis. The EIS will also address the cumulative impacts of the direct and indirect effects of past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future actions on the human environment. No decisions about the Proposed Action or any real estate actions would be taken until this EIS effort is complete. The Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Aviation Administration, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will participate as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the EIS.

Scoping Process

A 90-day scoping period will be open from August 26, 2016, through November 25, 2016. During this time, we welcome any comments you may have regarding the proposed project.

E.4 Draft Environmental Impact Statement Public Review and Comment Period

E.4.1 Draft Environmental Impact Statement Public Review and Comment Period Notifications

The Navy made significant efforts to notify the public of the release of the Draft EIS and the dates and locations of public meetings to maximize participation during the public review and comment period process. A summary of these efforts follows.

E.4.1.1 Federal Register Notices




Figure E-8: Newspaper Announcement of the Draft EIS Availability and Public Meetings

E.7 Comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement

Throughout the public comment period, a total of 1,466 unique comments were received. Public comments on the Draft EIS were submitted in three ways:

- Written or e-mailed comments (received any time during the public comment period)
 (393 comments).
- Comments submitted at a public meeting (written or oral) (written: 21 comments [number included in the above unique comment total]; oral: 59 comments).
- Comments submitted directly on the project website (received any time during the public comment period) (1,014 comments).

Additionally, form letters (with 584 signatures) and form postcards (with 290 signatures) were also received from various nongovernmental organizations.

Comments on the Draft EIS were received from 6 federal agencies, 13 state agencies, 22 county agencies, 89 nongovernmental organizations and business groups, 15 Native American tribes, and 447 private individuals.

Each comment was reviewed and categorized into specific resource areas or topics. One comment may include comments on multiple resource areas or topics. Appendix F (Public Comments and Responses) contains a summary of the comments received on the Draft EIS and the Navy's responses.

E.8 Final Environmental Impact Statement and Record of Decision

This Final EIS includes updates and revisions to the Draft EIS, a complete set of all substantive comments received on the Draft EIS, and the Navy's responses to such comments (Appendix F, Public Comments and Responses). Response to public comments may also take other forms, including correction of data, clarifications of and modifications to analytical approaches, and inclusion of additional data or analysis.

A 30-day waiting period will follow the issuance of the Final EIS. The Navy will sign a ROD after consideration of the Final EIS and public comments. The Navy will publish a *Notice of Availability of the ROD* in the *FR*; distribute the ROD to Indian Tribes, agencies, interested parties, and local newspapers; and post it on the FRTC EIS website. The ROD will document the Navy's final decision on the Proposed Action (to include identifying an action alternative as a proposal to be submitted to Congress for action), the rationale behind that decision, and any commitments to mitigation and monitoring. Congress will then review the Navy's proposal and ROD and will consider legislation for the proposed land withdrawal.
